

The 10th International Organ Competition of Saint-Maurice took place this August, the first competition under the new administration led by Charles Barbier. An international jury of seven was chaired by Jean-Marc Luisada, listening to eleven candidates from ten different countries. Performances were held on six organs both in Saint-Maurice and Lausanne.

FERRUCIO BUSONI INTERNATIONAL PIANO COMPETITION, BOLZANO

506 Candidates applied for the 63rd Edition of the Ferrucio Busoni International Piano Competition in Bolzano, Italy. Boosting a 72 year history, "the Busoni" has implemented a number of pandemic-driven changes which turned out to be hugely successful. Its preselection round was turned into a locally managed international event: the Glocal Piano Festival. 23 Steinway & Sons showrooms in 19 countries on 4 continents were made available for the filming of the

preselection, in which 93 candidates performed for a worldwide online audience.

The finals last August included chamber music performances with the Schumann Quartet and the Orchestra Haydn. While being held live in Bolzano, all the performances were streamed live not only on the Busoni's own channels, but also on Amadeus TV in China and on Naver in Korea.

TIBOR VARGA INTERNATIONAL VIOLIN COMPETITION, SION

25 young violinists (under 26 years old) were able to travel and perform live in Sion this year! All rounds were livestreamed through the Violin Channel and both Finals (Chamber music and with orchestra) were broadcast live. The three young Finalists played with the Lithuanian

Chamber Orchestra, under the baton of Sergej Krylov.

The deciding jury included Salvatore Accardo, Kolja Blacher, Friedemann Eichhorn, Koichiro Harada, Yuzoko Horigome, Michel Petrossian and Pavel Vernikov.


The 4th Éva Marton International Singing Competition, delayed to this year from 2020 due to the pandemic, was attended by a record 66

competitors. Even more applicants indicated their intention to participate, but some singers withdrew from the race at the last minute citing the still uncertain travel conditions. In addition to the highest ever number of applicants, the number of semi-finalists also hit a new record: 255 young talents from 47 countries submitted their videos in the spring of 2020, of which the preliminary jury chaired by Éva Marton invited 116 contestants to the live rounds of the competition..

This applies to all the quartets that participated, not just the finalists. You are all masters of arts and can safely dedicate your life to art.' Since its inauguration in 2000 the Quatuor Confluence, France Novo Quartet, Denmark/Poland Animato Kwartet, Norway/The Netherlands

Trondheim Competition has earned an international reputation, which is reflected in the growing number of international applicants each year. Previous winners include ensembles such as The Danish String Quartet, Van Kuijk Quartet and Trio con brio Copenhagen.

BESANCON INTERNATIONAL CONDUCTING COMPETITION

After an online First Round, from September 13-18, the final rounds of the Besançon Competition were held live in Besancon. While the jury was impressed by the three finalists (Jong-Jie Yin, Deun Lee and Chloé Dufresne), it nonetheless unanimously concluded that it was impossible to differentiate between them, because their performances were so markedly different from one another. The Grand Prix, the Besancon Competition's only prize, was not awarded. Instead, each of the three finalists was given a special mention and a cash award of EUR 3000.
